***The Wonderful Wizard of Oz* by Frank L. Baum J BAU**

Dorothy, the Tin Woodman, Scarecrow and the Cowardly Lion, set out on an exciting quest down the Yellow Brick Road in search of the elusive Wizard.



***The Secret Garden* by Frances Hodgson Burnett J BUR**

An orphan comes to live in a lonely house where she discovers an invalid cousin and the mysteries of a locked garden.



***Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* by Lewis Carroll J CAR**

A little girl falls down a rabbit hole and discovers a strange world inhabited by all sorts of unusual characters.



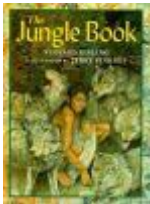
***Robinson Crusoe* by Daniel DeFoe J DEF**

The diary of an Englishman shipwrecked for almost thirty years on a small island.



***The Great Adventures of Sherlock Holmes* by Arthur Conan Doyle J DOY**

A collection of mystery adventures, including "A Scandal in Bohemia," "The Red-headed League," and "The Adventure of the Speckled Band."



***The Jungle Book* by Rudyard Kipling J KIP**

Selected stories chronicle the adventures of Mowgli, the boy reared by a pack of wolves in an Indian jungle.



***The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe* by C.S. Lewis J LEW**

Four English children find their way through the back of a wardrobe into the magic land of Narnia and assist Aslan, the golden lion, to triumph over the White Witch, who has cursed the land with eternal winter.



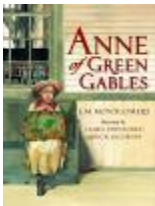
***Pippi Longstocking* by Astrid Lindgren J LIN**

Escapades of a lucky little girl who lives with a horse and a monkey - but without any parents - at the edge of a Swedish village.



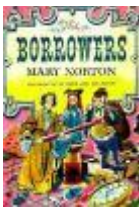
***White Fang* by Jack London J LON**

Presents the adventures in the northern wilderness of a dog who is part wolf and how he comes to make his peace with man.



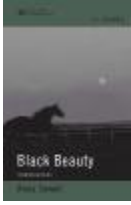
***Anne of Green Gables* by L.M. Montgomery J MON**

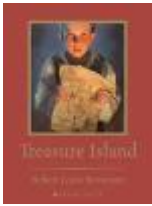
***The Borrowers* by Mary Norton J NOR**

Miniature people who live in an old country house by borrowing things from humans are forced to emigrate from their home under a clock.



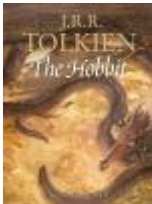
***Black Beauty* by Anna Sewell J SEW**

***The Hobbit, Or, There and Back Again* by J. R. R. Tolkien J TOL**

Bilbo Baggins, a hobbit, lives comfortably in his hobbit hole until the day the wandering wizard Gandalf chooses him to take part in an adventure from which he may never return.



***Mary Poppins* by P.L. Travers J TRA**

The wind brings four English children a new nanny who slides up the banister and introduces them to some delightful people and experiences.



***The Adventures of Tom Sawyer* by Mark Twain J TWA**

The adventures of a mischievous young boy and his friends growing up in a Mississippi River town in the nineteenth century.



***Around the World in Eighty Days* by Jules Verne J VER**

An eccentric Englishman accepts a challenge to circle the globe with unprecedented speed. Exotic locales, seemingly insurmountable obstacles, and comic relief provide a fantastic adventure.



***Little House on the Prairie* by Laura Ingalls Wilder J WIL**

A family travels from the big woods of Wisconsin to a new home on the prairie, where they build a house, meet neighboring Indians, build a well, and fight a prairie fire.



***The Swiss Family Robinson* by Johann David Wyss J WYS**

Relates the fortunes of a shipwrecked family as they imaginatively adapt to life on an island abundantly inhabited by animal and plant life.
