While a little boy spends a day playing with his older sister, he asks many questions about princesses.

Princess, Princess by Penny Dale

E DAL

A young princess and her friends sleep under the spell of a fairy she forgot to invite to her birthday party, until someone comes along to awaken them.

Polite as a Princess by Melissa Arps

E DIS

A walk-through visit with Disney's most famous fairy tale princesses, in scenes that display their always proper etiquette and lady-like manners.

Princess Pigtoria and the Pea by Pamela Duncan Edwards

E EDW

To make her pigsty of a palace picturesque again, penniless Princess Pigtoria tries to get the pompous porker Prince Proudfoot to propose marriage.

Princesses Are Not Perfect by Kate Lum

E LUM

Three princesses, each with a particular skill, decide they are bored with what they do and swap jobs.

Princess Picky by Marjorie Priceman

E PRI

When Nicki refuses to eat her vegetables, she goes from being called Princess Perfect to Princess Picky, and the worried king orders his staff to create bribes fit for a finicky royal eater.

The Apple-pip Princess by Jane Ray

E RAY

In a land that has stood barren, parched by drought and ravaged by frosts since the Queen's death, the King sets his three daughters the task of making the kingdom bloom again, and discovers that sometimes the smallest things can make the biggest difference.

The Silk Princess by Charles Santore

E SAN

After a cocoon falls into her tea cup and unravels to form a long, delicate thread, Hsi-Ling Chi, a princess in ancient China, meets a mysterious man who reveals how to transform the cocoons into silk.

Not All Princesses Dress in Pink by Jane Yolen

E YOL
